PRIORITY VACCINATION TO PROTECT THOSE WORKING WITH HOMELESS PEOPLE

I am writing from national homelessness charity Oasis Community Housing to request your support as Member of Parliament for a constituency in which we serve the homeless. Our request is that you raise in Parliament the issue of prioritising COVID vaccinations for those working with homeless people (and for homeless people themselves) with the Minister for COVID Vaccine Deployment, Nadhim Zahawi MP.

Oasis Community Housing supports almost 2,000 men, women and vulnerable families experiencing homelessness every year. We address both the immediate needs and root causes of homelessness through our 17 projects across the UK, including our resource drop-in centres in Gateshead and Sunderland, an accredited Foyer in Croylon, and anetwork of supported housing projects for homeless young people across Southwark.

During the first lockdown, Oasis Community Housing was at the forefront of the 'Everyone In' scheme. Our frontline staff had to very quickly redesign support services and vere able to support 280 people in their new temporary accommodation. Thereafter, we worked with partners to make sure that every single one of these included moved on interpore permanent accommodation; we delivered emergency food and sapitary parcels; we made over 200 referrals to our partner agencies; and delivered almost 1,700 support sessions.

As you will know, current data strongly indicates that the single greatest, isk of mortality from COVID-19 is increasing age and that the risk increases exponentially with age. Furthermore, adults of any age with certain underlying medical conditions are at increase risk for severe illness from the virus. Based on this data, we know eople with no home are at high COVID harm risk.

People with no home are old before their time. Levels of failty – which include the key features of unintentional weight lost feelings of exhaustion; wealness; slow walking speed; and low levels of physical activity – amongst hose with no home are comparable to 89-year-olds in the general population.

Research has also found that people with to home have an average of seven long-term health conditions, far higher than people in their 90s. People with no home are substantially more likely than even the most deprived housed people to report having chronic diseases such as asthma, chronic OPD and heart problems.

People with no home die young. The mean age at death of homeless people was 46 years for men, 43 years for women as compared to the general population mean age of 76 years for men and 81 years for women.^{III}

Just as residents of care homes are at higher clinical risk of severe disease, so are those who use single homeless hostels and other shared homeless accommodation for rough sleepers.

Correspondingly, frontline homelessness support workers therefore at increased personal risk of exposure to infection with COVID-19 and of transmitting that injection to susceptible and vulnerable people in shared homelessness accommodation.

As you will also know, the JCVI rightly considers frontline health and social care workers who provide care to vulnerable people a high priority for vaccination. We welcome the most recent JCVI advice that vaccination of those at increased risk of exposure to CCVID due to their occupation could also be a priority in the next phase of vaccine roll-out. The committee identifies a number of workers who might be prioritised in this way: first responders, the military, those involves in the justice system, teachers, transport workers. We believe that it is people working in necessarily close proximity to people with compromised health and so increased susceptibility to COVID infection and harm, frontline homelessness staff must also be prioritised.

Therefore, we request that you raise this mater with a parliamer tary question to the Minister for COVID Vaccine peloyment asking that staff who are working with people who have no home, as a matter of urgence, are added to the Priority Occupation list for The Next Phase of vaccination (published on 2 December 2020)

As a member of Homeless link, the national membership charity for frontline homelessness agencies, we are aware that hey have raised this matter with the Minister for COVID Vaccination Deployment directly. However, he feel that his approach will be strengthened if it is further raised by multiple MPs across the country so we would greatly appreciate your support.
